

# THERE IS A MOUNTAIN OF WORK AHEAD

We praise God for the blessings and challenges of His work in north-east Brazil as EAB presses on towards its 80th year.

We have just inaugurated a new 2nd church at Campina Grande, which seats 265, and where the local pastor Hamilton already is planning on services being relayed to an overflow hall before long. At the other end of the size spectrum we are inaugurating a little church out in the wilds at Água Grande, up in the mountains, much deeper into the interior. We rejoice because people are coming to Christ in the cities and in the villages.

The Campina Grande Bible College sees 16 graduate in this its 15th year of ministry, so it's good seeing new leaders going into the harvest fields. Others are doing an excellent degree course, by extension online, which the Ministry of Education gives full recognition.

However the violence across this land is quite abominable with most of it being related to social inequality and the parallel drug abuse and trafficking. For years I have asked God to show us a way to reach out to drug and alcohol addicts, and this year the Lord brought right to us a Christian psychologist from the south of Brazil who works for a Christian specialist organization in this field and which is known in Britain as HopeUK. This brother gave a team of EAB/ACEV workers training and we have just started this very challenging project with weekly self-help meetings guided by our team. Please pray for this incipient project that God might bring in those in need of such help and guide

us to help them.

Please pray for us too because as the project develops and becomes known we are sure to face the wrath of the drug dealers.

Another of our projects which reach into the drug ridden slums involves our regular 'Soup Runs' which are now led by Philip's wife Gylmara. This reaching out to the "five thousand" sees our team taking food and Gospel tracts to the desperately poor. The team is also often asked to pray for people who are sick or in special need. One of our church's policemen always accompanies the soup run team in support as our folk move into very dangerous territory.

It is this overall integral approach to Christian ministry which touches people's lives and also speaks to those who are better off as they see the church in action. William Booth used to speak about ministering in 19th century London with "Soap, Soup and Salvation". EAB is just lacking the soap part!

### RECYCLING CLOTHING



The Patos church members donated clothing for a "jumble sale" for the poor.

It was advertised as starting at 7.30am one Saturday morning, but people were arriving at 6.00am to get the bargains! The sale was a total success as clothing was recycled and it made £270 for the church's work among the poor.

'Zé Paulino & Rosa dos Gatos'

In Brazil the Mission's anniversary is celebrated on the nearest Sunday to September 2nd, date on which EAB founders Albert and Daisy Mundy first arrived in Brazil 79 years ago.

This year I, together with Liz and our drama director Dilma, wrote a Missions play which was given its first performance on the day. The play tells part of our history, exalts the glorious grace of God and challenges youth for the future of missions.

Rosa dos Gatos (Rose of the Cats) was so named because she made and sold plaster of Paris large model cats.

She was married to Antonio until she had an affair around 1940 with Zé Paulino, who was to be the first EAB/ACEV evangelist. They planned and carried out her husband's murder to be together, but were caught and sent to jail.

There Albert Mundy preached the Gospel and the infamous couple were gloriously converted.

When they had served their sentence they became fervent members of EAB's first church at Princesa Isabel and Zé Paulino helped Albert construct the first EAB church building where he was consecrated as an evangelist. Zé Paulino led many to Christ but died in his 40s. Following the death bed scene, where the evangelist vet led his final soul to Christ, the play ends with him being received by Jesus in glory, and there wasn't a dry eye in the church. "Where sin abounds... grace much more abounds"!

At the Patos Church are a group who formed "Christians in Action" which

help small pioneer churches scattered throughout the area.

The team visit small congregations and help with their services when they sing, read the Bible, pray, give testimonies and preach, as well as helping at outreaches.

One evening I spoke at the beautiful village of Picotes, about 14 miles from Patos, down a mud track. The picturesque village nestles against a mountain and has not changed since it was built, and is used as a set in films. The one committed Christian who lives there has gathered a group

of interested folk. We met the small congregation on the veranda of her house, supported by the Christians in Action group.

At Ipueira the church plant is slow, but more developed, with 5 committed Christians. I was preaching there one evening. Heavy rain was forecast but it was still decided to hold the service in the street outside the house they rent as a base for the outreach.

The Christians in Action group set up the loud speakers so the entire neighbourhood could

hear the service too! It was while I was speaking the rain started – huge drops without warning, so immediately all the electrical equipment was moved into the small house followed by people carrying their chairs. They squashed into 3 rooms, and the service continued! Christians in Action are also responsible for the church at Onça and also support the Landless Community and the church at Passagem.

Across the work of EAB and their sister organisation in Brazil ACEV, there are 18 well established larger churches, 27 smaller churches and 36 small church plants in various stages of being established. Please pray for these church plants which are projects of faith which take years to build up.

### NEW VEHICLE

A new manual pump has been installed at the site of a well at Quilombo (ex-slave community) Domingos Ferreira, bringing water and hope to the locals.

This is one of many wells we have initiated this year, bring the total wells we have provided to over 300.

The mud and stone roads and harsh weather take a toll on our vehicles which particularly carry heavy equipment for wells around to distant villages in the outback. We have had to replace our tired, worn-out and unreliable vehicle with a smart Fiat Strada which is essential for our social projects to help needy people.

# FLORES DO SERTAO

(FLOWERS OF THE FOREST) by Marian Rashleigh

Liz and I went to the church for a craft session with the Flores do Sertao, who are ladies from the Placas, a slum area on the edge of town.

These women are abused by men, and earn very little money by scavenging on the nearby rubbish tip for paper, plastics and metal, or take part in the drug industry.

They used to meet in a rented place near their homes but the men were issuing death threats to our staff. They now meet on a Wednesday and Thursday afternoons at the Patos church, and are taught crafts so they have another way to earn a living. The ladies were so happy to be there, away from the pressures of where they live, knowing they can get support and help, including food parcels if they haven't anything to eat.

What I thought was lovely was that they had all been given T-shirts with a flower emblem on them and their group name. It gave them status and a sense of belonging. The staff wore the same T-shirts so anyone walking in would see the ladies as equals.

They were an assortment of ages, but quickly settled down. The ladies struggled with measuring at 2cm intervals but once we got onto making the beads, they were pleased to see their creations becoming bracelets, and once finished they proudly wore them.

Three of the ladies had not come. One was in prison having tried to smuggle drugs to her husband who was in prison, another had been beaten up and badly injured by her manfriend, who then set fire to all her belongings. The 15 year old son of the third lady had been stabbed 6 times on a high bridge near to John and Liz's home.

The two youths then threw him over the top of the bridge and he landed about thirty feet down onto the embankment. They left him to die, with the knife still in his backbone. He was seen by a lady who called the emergency services.

After a few days in the local hospital his mother was told he was paralysed from the waist down and they couldn't do any more for him so asked her to prepare to have him home. He had many bedsores so they said his mother had to buy a water mattress as well as continence pads and toiletries. His mother works on the rubbish tip scavenging for things to sell and could not afford any of these so EAB/ACEV bought them.

He was to have a tracheotomy to aid his breathing, and she was told to put a ceiling in her house as the dust would get into his throat - it is a mud hut. The youth was transferred to a hospital in the state capital city, Campina Grande, where he had an operation on his lung and kidney. He remained in intensive care, where he died a few days later. Two boys have been arrested: one has been released because he didn't injure the boy, only held him while his friend did the stabbing!
